Egyptian President visits India - Strengthens partnership

President of Egypt, His Excellency Abdel Fattah El-Sisi, was the guest of honour at India's 74th Republic Day function on January 26, 2023 at New Delhi. During his 4-day State visit to India (January 24 to 27), the President helmed the India-Egypt Business Roundtable held on January 25, 2023.

The participants at the Business Roundtable included ministers from both India and Egypt, senior government functionaries, representatives from trade bodies, industrial leaders and company representatives. India's Commerce and Industry, Consumer Affairs, Food and Public Distribution and Textile Minister, Piyush Goyal, led the Indian side at the Roundtable.

Delivering the keynote address, the Egyptian President, stressed the opportunities available in his country for overseas investment.

The Sanmar Group Deputy Chairman, Vijay Sankar, spoke about the vital role being played by India-Egypt Business Council for over a decade in

assisting and supporting companies from both countries. He also mentioned the attractive industrial climate in Egypt, and impressed upon the Indian companies to explore good business opportunities available there. Their Royal Highnesses Crown Prince and Princess of Denmark visit Chennai

In a first from the Danish Royal family in two decades, Denmark's Crown Prince Frederik Andre Henrik Christian and Crown Princess Mary Elizabeth paid an official visit to India at the invitation of Vice President Jagdeep Dhankhar. His Royal Highness, the Crown Prince had last visited India in 2003. Earlier, Her Majesty Queen Margrethe II visited India in 1963 as Crown Princess, and later Princess Benedikte visited Chennai in 2004.

The Royal Couple was accompanied by Denmark's Minister of Foreign Affairs, Lars Lokke Rasmussen, Minister for Environment, Magnus Heunicke, and Minister for Climate, Energy and Utilities, Lars Aagaard, along with senior officials and a high-level business delegation visited Chennai on March 1, 2023. Prior to visiting Chennai, the Crown Prince

couple were in Delhi on February 26, 2023. The visit of the royal couple is bound to further strengthen and enhance the close and friendly ties between India and Denmark.

The Crown Prince visited the IIT Madras Research Park, where a session on next-generation fuels and energy systems was held. "Tamil Nadu has identified 15 offshore locations to establish wind turbines. Denmark is collaborating on a plan to establish the first wind farm offshore in Tamil Nadu. I have a strong belief that we can support one another in developing these technologies while learning how they can be implemented in different contexts," said Lars Aagaard.

Additional Chief Secretary, Industries Department, Government of Tamil Nadu, S Krishnan, was present on behalf of the Government of Tamil Nadu. A total of four projects were






announced, for which memorandums of understanding were signed. IIT Madras will collaborate with Danish researchers on a project on the hydrogen economy. FLSmidth has joined as the founding member of the Energy Consortium, IIT Madras, according to an MoU signed. Danfoss and IIT Madras will undertake joint work on drinking water for the coastal regions using renewable energy, according to another MoU.

To mark the visit of the Royal Highnesses to Chennai, the Royal Danish Consulate, Chennai, brought out two books. One was on the Sanmar-Danish relationship that spanned over four decades. And the other, on the Tamil Nadu and Denmark's 400 years and more

The event was attended by the Danish Royal delegation including HRH The Crown Prince of Denmark, HRH The Crown Princess of Denmark, the Danish Minister for Climate, Danish Minister for Foreign Affairs and the Danish Ambassador to India, HE Freddy Svane, Honorary Consul General, Royal Danish Consulate in Chennai, Vijay Sankar and Honorary Vice Consul, Royal Consulate in Chennai, Danish SB Prabhakar Rao. On behalf of the Government of Tamil Nadu, Minister of Finance, Palanivel Thiagarajan and Minister of Information technology and Digital services, Mano Thangaraj graced the event.

This was followed by a dinner hosted by Danish Major Grundfos to mark their silver jubilee year in India.

Sanmar and Denmark Connect

It all began seventy five years ago—in 1947—when Chairman Emeritus of The Sanmar Group, KS Narayanan, travelled to Copenhagen to study cement technology at the Danish major, FLSmidth—more than three hundred years after the first Danes arrived in Tranquebar on the Coromandel coast.

From the time Honorary Consuls for Denmark were appointed, only Danes residing in India were for long considered for the appointment. KS Narayanan was the first Indian to be appointed Honorary Consul of Denmark in 1975.

Sankar succeeded Narayanan as the Honorary Consul General of the Royal Danish Consulate in 1989 and held that post till 2017. He was succeeded by his son Vijay Sankar. The Danish association spreads over three generations and remains rock solid.

SB Prabhakar Rao, one of the earliest employees of The Sanmar Group, remains a crucial fulcrum connecting the generations in the Sanmar family in this inter-country bonding exercise, as the Honorary Vice Consul of Denmark in Chennai.

The promoter family of The Sanmar Group, has an over seven-decade connection with Denmark, including a nearly five-decade long close association with the Danish Ministry of Foreign Affairs. They represent the Danish Consular Affairs in South India, protecting the interests of Denmark and its expatriates and promoting economic, cultural, social and commercial interests in the southern States of India.

Danish History - both interesting and intriguing

The history of Denmark, as with most nations, is filled with interesting and intriguing events. The Danish monarchy is one of the oldest in the world. In the 9th century, the country was actually divided into different kingdoms, but by the next century, it became one. As a group, the Danes were the sea-faring type and they raided other parts of Europe like England and Ireland. However, they were more than just rapacious raiders, and they created the first towns in Ireland — Limerick, Cork, and Dublin.

Amidst the wars and raids, there was a religious churn in Denmark, and historians mark the efforts of some Christian missionaries at proselytisation as a major watershed in the annals of Scandinavia (and by extension, Denmark).

Middle ages of the Danes

By the Middle Ages, Denmark started to lurch towards a firmer identity. Valdemar I, who was the king of Denmark between 1157 and 82), ended the Wend (Slav) threat to Danish shipping. He won independence from the Holy Roman emperor, and gained church approval for hereditary rule by his dynasty, the Valdemars. From then on, the country began to grow steadily richer.

The daughter of King Valdemar IV of Denmark, Margaret, was another important historical figure. When she was six-years-old, she was betrothed to Haakon, king of Norway and son of King Magnus Eriksson of Sweden and Norway. Soon, Margaret became Regent of both Denmark and Norway. In 1388 Swedish nobles rebelled against their king and declared Margaret, Regent of Sweden. In 1389 her soldiers captured the Swedish king although his supporters held out in Stockholm until 1398. Margaret became the undisputed ruler of the three Scandinavian states. In 1397 Erik, grandson of her sister, was crowned king of Denmark, Sweden, and Norway at Kalmar. This union of three kingdoms was

called the Union of Kalmar. Its capital was Copenhagen.

From 1784, Crown Prince Frederick was Regent of Denmark and he introduced reforms.

By the mid-20th century, Denmark had found its identity and was happy with it. It remained neutral during the First and Second World Wars. In 1949 Denmark joined NATO and in 1953, the Danish constitution was changed.

The Monarchy as it is today

When he signed The Constitutional Act of Denmark in 1849,


King Frederik VII converted the Danish monarchy into a constitutional monarchy.

Queen Margrethe II (born 1940) has been Denmark's monarch since 1972. She is the first female monarch of Denmark since Queen Margrethe I (1376-1412). Her son Crown Prince

Frederik André Henrik Christian (born 1968) will be the next one to ascend the throne, part of a line that reaches all the way back to Gorm the Old (believed to be born around year 900) and Harald Bluetooth (born around 940). Prince Frederik's son Christian (born 2005) will continue the line into the future. (On 14 May 2004, the Crown Prince married Mary Elizabeth Donaldson, who is now the Crown Princess).

Today, Denmark is a constitutional monarchy ruled by a representative democracy.

Danish heritage in Tamil Nadu



Tranquebar (Tharangambadi)

Tranquebar, known for many centuries as Tharangambadi, the land of the singing waves, is 284 km away from Chennai. It was the first Danish trading colony in the tropics in the period 1620–1845. Once a busy port, this town helped the Danes to export pepper, tea and silk from India to Denmark.

The Danes reached India at Tharangambadi, a part of the kingdom of Thanjavur in 1620. Its king, Raghunatha Nayak, granted them Tharangambadi under a treaty with King of Denmark, Christian IV. He also gave them permission to build a fort there. In 1620, the Danish East India Company was established. Two centuries of Danish heritage has left important cultural and architectural imprints, which can be seen in colonial houses, churches, cemeteries, and, most notably, the Dansborg Fort.

Kaj Schmidt Memorial in Chennai

Schmidt Memorial on Elliot's Beach at Besant Nagar, Chennai, commemorates the gallantry of a Dane, Kaj Erik Gjolstad Schmidt. Kaj Schmidt went bathing at Elliot's Beach on the second-last day of 1930, along with four co-workers from the East Asiatic Company. They noticed three swimmers in peril in the water and immediately went to their rescue. In the process Kaj Schmidt was carried away by the waves and lost his life. Moved by Schmidt's act of sacrifice, Lieutenant-Colonel Sir George Frederick Stanley, Governor of Madras, ordered the construction of a memorial in his honour. The memorial was unveiled on November 29, 1931.

we were doing. This was a man who could claim he was owning the newspaper. After all he was bringing in the funding, he was calling all the corporate donors."



Iconic Institutions of Chennai

Stanley Medical College and Hospital

Among the iconic institutions that add heft to the stature of Chennai as the medical capital of India is the Stanley Medical College and Hospital. The history of this preeminent institution makes for fascinating reading. Its origins though were humble. According to many historical accounts, the college and the hospital emerged from the womb of a hospital and dispensary, named Infirmary', which was established by the Assistant Surgeon John Holen Underwood in 1797. This nondescript dispensary grew up to the Royapuram Medical School in 1903. It was a

small school that operated out of the Old Bullet Factory of the East India Company, according to an article in the newsmagazine, *Madras Musings*.

But it was when the five-year LMP (Laboratory Medicine and Pathobiology) course was inaugurated on March 27, 1934, the Royapuram Medical School was renamed Stanley Medical School in honour of the then Governor of Madras Presidency Sir George Fredrick Stanley.

In 1938, the Stanley Medical School was upgraded as Stanley Medical College. The college, which was affiliated to the Madras University then, took in 72 students to the MBBS course in its inaugural year. Simultaneously, between 1937 and 1939, the new clinics opened included those for venereal, leprosy, dental, ear, nose and throat, and ophthalmic, and separate clinics were organised Departments of Medicine, Surgery, TB, Dermatology, Electro-Cardiography and Orthopaedics. Permission to start MD and MS courses was given in 1948.

As we said, the beginnings were unheralded, and many departments of the then fledgling institution operated out of the Madras Medical College, and it remained tied to the coattails of the latter till 1950 when



Stanley Medical College became an independent institution.

From then on there was no looking back as the institution grew from strength to strength, notching many a first in the medical annals of the country. As far as known from published records, the first successful heart operation in India was done in Stanley Hospital on November 10, 1948, on a girl of 11 years with persistent patent ductus arteriosus.

By 1952, the Department of Anatomy was upgraded with courses for MSc and PhD in Anatomy. The institution of a Dean to administer both the College and Hospital was created the same year.

There are many doyens who helped the hospital and college to blaze a new trail. The first Dean was Ananthanarayana Iver established the Institute of Anatomy at Stanley in 1955. The plastic surgery unit at Stanley officially began in 1971 thanks to the efforts of alumnus Prof. Dr R Venkataswami. In 1973, the Hand Injury Service Centre, the first in the country, was started. In 1980, the Centre introduced microsurgery for hand injuries, the first in the country. The hospital's Department of Surgical Gastroenterology was the first public sector hospital in India to perform a successful liver transplant in 1995.

Today, most of the old buildings have been replaced by newer structures in order to cater to the needs of a larger patient population. A rare surviving bit



of heritage in a forgotten corner is an obelisk with the Aesculapius insignia raised in Maj. EWC Bradfield's time to remember 12 doctors who sacrificed their lives in the Great War.

Stanley Medical College is rated one among the top medical colleges in the country, and some of the well known names in the medical fraternity have had their foundation here. illustrious Among its alumni are: Dr Prathap Chandra Dr N Mathrubootham, Reddy, Dr Sudhagar Eswaran, Dr Govindappa Venkataswamy, popularly known as Dr V, Dr Vilayanur Subramanian Ramachandran, Dr Tonse Madhava Ananth Pai, and Dr Balu Sankaran.

The list is endless. So is the service that the hospital and the college is rendering.
